# ANTI-BULLYING PLAN 2022

## Great Lakes College Forster Campus

Bullying behaviour has three key features. It involves the intentional misuse of power in a relationship. It is ongoing and repeated, and it involves behaviours that can cause harm. The NSW Department of Education requires all NSW public schools to have an Anti-bullying Plan which details the strategies implemented to reduce student bullying behaviours.

## Resources

Schools are encouraged to visit the website to support whole-school prevention, early intervention and response approaches and strategies for student bullying behaviour.

## Great Lakes College Forster Campus' Commitment

Our school rejects all forms of bullying behaviours, including online bullying by maintaining a commitment to providing a safe, inclusive, and respectful learning community that promotes student wellbeing. All staff are committed to establishing evidence-based approaches and strategies that promote a positive climate where bullying is less likely to occur.

## 1. School Culture and Inclusion

All members of the school community are active participants in building a welcoming school culture that values diversity and fosters positive relationships. A key component of a supportive school culture is building respectful relationships and an ethos that bullying is not accepted, in both online and offline environments. School staff will actively respond to student bullying behaviour.

Our school engages in the following practices to promote a positive school culture.

### 1.1 Student Assemblies

Student bullying and expectations about student behaviour will be discussed and information presented to promote a positive school culture where bullying is not accepted.

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#### Staff Communication and Professional Learning 1.2

Staff will be supported with professional learning that provides evidence-based ways to encourage and teach positive social and emotional wellbeing and discourage, prevent, identify, and respond effectively to student bullying behaviour.

Term 2	Sentral training for all staff on how to record bullying/conflict incidents.

## 2. Partnerships With Families and Community

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### 2.2 Communication With Parents

Our school will provide information to parents to help promote a positive school culture where bullying is not acceptable and to increase parent's understanding of how our school addresses all forms of bullying behaviour.

### 3. Support For Wellbeing and Positive Behaviours

Our school's practices support student wellbeing and positive behaviour approaches that align with our school community's needs.

Social and emotional skills related to personal safety, resilience, help-seeking and protective behaviours are explicitly taught across the curriculum in Personal Development, Health, and Physical Education (PDHPE).

Examples of other ways our school will embed student wellbeing and positive behaviour approaches and strategies in practices include the following.

- "Meet and greets" each morning at school gates from staff to students; PBL points and merits to promote expected behaviour
- Whole school assemblies promote positive wellbeing initiatives and a culture of high expectations
- Fortnightly school assemblies and PBL Fun Days to support positive engagement and student connectedness
- Anti-Bullying workshops and programs delivered in the 7-10 Mandatory PE curriculum are conducted that explore themes of bullying and positive peer relationships, Tell Them From Me student survey
- Access to counselling support, Year Adviser mentors, Head Teacher Wellbeing, Student Support Officer, external agencies and teacher support as required
- Positive wellbeing programs to support building positive relationship skills

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
