Dear Parents

I have many things to report on this coming week.

Firstly, there has been tremendous support for the Coles 'Supporting School Sport' program. We have received huge numbers of vouchers and there are still a number of days to continue collection. Your support in this endeavour is very much appreciated.

Secondly, I recently sent out two surveys: one for our RAP program and the other for the Chaplaincy program. We have had huge returns for each of these surveys. I am currently surveying teachers about these programs – and students as well. I will provide a complete overview of responses in the next issue of the Dolphin. A huge thanks to those parents who have returned the surveys – and for the positive comments on them!

Our NAPLAN results came in towards the end of term and the staff have spent some significant time analysing the results. Most impressive of the results were those of the ATSI students where there was significant growth from Year 7 through to Year 9. Writing was the area displaying the most growth. We have already begun shaping our targets for 2012 and the area upon which we will focus for literacy will be Grammar. In numeracy, we will continue our focus on number, patterns and algebra. Staff have already commenced work in these areas.

In the last week of Term 3, Saul Brady supported by a large number of his peers organised a 'Forster's Got Talent'. He, together with his mother, Di Brady secured about \$500 in prizes for the event. There was a huge response to the event and \$1290.40 was raised. Congratulations to all who participated, supported and organised the event.

This is a busy time of the year but I would still urge all parents to come along to our next P&C meeting which will be held in Tuncurry Library commencing at 7.30pm. The school will be presenting some information about Facebook – issues and responsibilities. This will provide great information and support for parents in relation to this complex issue.

Finally, exam week will be in Week 5 – so all students should be working hard and preparing to do their best.

Deputy Principal's Report

This is already shaping up to be very busy term with staff planning excursions, class trips, exams and special team activities.

I have been very pleased with the way many of the students have had a positive start with correct uniform and living our core values. Can I remind you that if students do not have their correct uniform then they have to have a note explaining the reason for them being out of uniform. Consistently not having uniform without a note can lead to disciplinary action for persistent refusal to follow instructions, and none of us want that.

It is timely also to remind you that we have a truancy process that picks up students who are away from class without the permission of their teacher. Sometimes this means that students who are on school business will get a truancy note as well and have to explain their absence to the Deputy Principal. I view this as a good thing as we need to be able to account for the whereabouts of all students at all times and sometimes our documentation and communication processes can let us down. If a student receives a truancy note for a period when they were on school business they simply need to go and explain their whereabouts to the Deputy and the

matter is dealt with. They will NOT have a truancy notice on their records and we can examine what happened with our communication processes that lead to the students being marked as truant in the first place. This will help us improve our systems.

I have published the planner for the term and it has been uploaded onto the website. Please check the calendar for dates and activities that are up-coming. It is especially important to be aware of the examination dates and end of year activity dates for our Year 10 students. In the next Dolphin I will publish the School Certificate Examination timetable and protocols associated with the different examinations and what will happen as the week unfolds. Mrs Ralston and Mrs Horne have issued the students with a sequential calendar (checklist) of events and requirements for the term last week. This, along with the timetable for exams, will be must reading for all of our Year 10 students so don't miss it. At this stage please ensure you avoid planning any activities that will take the students away from school during the week beginning November 8 (week 5).

I am pleased to inform you that we will be opening the oval for general use again during lunchtime in a few weeks. The STC group will be talking with students about our expectations around the use of the oval but I wanted to remind you about them as well. Students are to eat and drink off the oval. Taking food and drink onto the oval creates many issues. Students are to remain inside the perimeter of the school at all times so, if any balls are kicked over the fence they will have to remain there until after school. The oval is an active, not passive area, and activities should be non-contact so, tackling and pushing and shoving are out of the question. Furthermore, students should follow the instructions of staff at all times, even when on the oval.

Finally, can I take this opportunity to remind all parents of Year 9 and Year 10 students, that the students are responsible for the safe-keeping of their laptops at ALL times. This means that if they leave their laptops in their bags in the playground unattended, and they get damaged, then they will be responsible for the cost of the repairs.
