Principal's Report

Higher Order Thinking is one of our main focus areas for this year. In the classroom it is centred around extending the thinking of students through engaging them in challenging activities by extending their thinking. Over the past four weeks, teachers have been reflecting on the way that they phrase questions and design activities so that students can explore new ways of doing things and make connections with other learning and concepts.

Faculties have been challenged to design activities and tasks that involve higher order thinking and share these with colleagues. Our staff and faculty meetings have been lively scenes of professional discussion and creativity as a result. The impact for students will see them more fully engaged in their learning and improving their performance in assessments.

We are also working hard on our literacy strategy – tying this in with our focus on higher order thinking. The main focus for the first five weeks of this term has been on how to answer inferential questions. These ask the student to carefully consider the whole text and draw reasoned conclusions as a result.

I am very impressed with the way all staff are working in these areas and as I visit classrooms, I have seen many examples of deep student engagement. The atmosphere is beyond busy – it's learner-centred and focused – something that is great to see!

The TAS Faculty has started 2010 with a real buzz. All students are working hard on projects in both Elective and Mandatory Courses. This year has seen a slight staffing change with Mr Steve Castles now working part time within our TAS Faculty.

FEES

All the TAS courses require students to pay fees and all money collected is used to purchase materials. Without student contributions we would not be able to function as effectively and the project work which your child undertakes would become very limited. Could I take this opportunity to remind all that paying outstanding fees is very much appreciated and necessary to support your child's learning.

SAFE FOOTWEAR

When students are using all TAS Classrooms, they must wear a minimum standard of footwear, this is a requirement set by Workcover to meet the rules of the NSW Occupational Health and Safety Act.

The minimum requirements of shoes which are acceptable in practical rooms are:

The foot must be fully enclosed by the shoe.

The shoe must have a solid leather or vinyl upper.

The shoe must have a solid / rigid sole.

The school uniform policy also requires that the shoes be black.

Could parents also take these minimum requirements into consideration when purchasing new shoes for school.

SKILLS CENTRE FOR SCHOOL STUDENTS INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

During 2009 we received a grant for Capital Development and Equipment. This includes the purchase of equipment in Metal and Timber Technology and Hospitality areas. Year 10 Netbooks

All students in Year 10 have netbooks. These have been loaned to the student until they complete Year 12. As such they are Department of Education property. Students are responsible for repairing their laptop (or that of others) if they misuse it. The screens on the netbooks are easily damaged and cost \$380 to replace. Students have been reminded about the need to take care of this important learning tool.



In line with the rollout of Laptops for the Year 10 students, the HSIE department at Forster Campus has introduced an informative website for students studying History for the 2010 School Certificate. The website provides students with the initial information that relates to key learning areas they are studying. The use of various media has advanced from the days of the textbook. Students are now able to access text, photo images, sound files and video clips.

The feedback posted through the online questionnaires has identified that the website is being accessed during and after school hours. This indicates that students are engaged with this form of technology, making it an effective tool to further their learning in and beyond the classroom. Within the classroom the site reinforces the content of the lesson, giving students a better understanding of historical events. When studying at home, students can use the site as a basis before researching further. They may also email their teacher, contribute to the website and upload work for advice.

The indications so far show that students are being more productive and are achieving a higher level of competency. The HSIE staff are keenly watching the developments of this interactive website with the future plans of expanding to encompass Geography and History sites for other year groups.

We are greatly indebted to these local businesses for their generous support. Ultimately it is their contribution which has a tangible effect in helping keep our students well organised and focused on learning.

In 2010-11 staff have identified two quality teaching targets to pursue. These are the concept of engagement in learning and the ability of students to regulate their own behaviour and attitude to learning within the classroom.

Staff have worked through a series of steps and created a list of statements. The next step is to survey students in order to gain a benchmark from which progress can be evaluated.

During the year, we will use a number of strategies to improve student engagement and student self-regulation with boys in general in mind and lower achieving boys and girls at TSC.

ATTENDANCE

Regular daily attendance is often a good indicator of how a student will perform ultimately. Once a pattern of skipping days is established, it can sometimes be very hard to revert to good, regular daily attendance and for every day missed, the student can fall further and further behind.

Often there are very good reasons for a student's absence but sometimes it is merely because the student has fallen into a habit of doing so. Work can never be fully caught up as it's not just a matter of copying up someone else's work.

Students should closely examine the number of days missed so far and ask why and parents should contact the school and ask for a printout or details of missed lessons or days absent.

Students should be at school every day unless there's a good reason to keep them home. When absent, a note from the parent/ caregiver is required.

EXAMINATIONS

The first set of Year 12 exams take place from March 22 to April 1. Year 12 should be well into revision by now. These exams are an important part of the assessment program and their value forms part of their ATAR result.

Staff have access now to six Interactive Whiteboards as well as four sets of mobile pods of laptops to use in

the classroom. Whilst such technology does not replace more traditional means of teaching and learning, it does meet Gen Y at their point of need and is certainly resulting in dynamic lessons.

A number of staff are attending the two day Quality Teaching Conference in Coffs Harbour in March with others attending a two day conference in Sydney during the July holidays on Engaging Learners through Innovative Practice.

Staff Development Day Two and Three take place on the first day of Term 2 and 3 and are student free days. We are planning the content of these at present.

The first Parent/Teacher/student afternoon is for students in Year 11 and their parents and takes place on Thursday March 18 from 3.50 to about 7pm. Students will have booking sheets issued prior to the event.

Senior Campus Laptops

Senior campus has started using our allocation of DER laptops. Even though the program is focused around Year 9 students, we still received an allocation of laptops to bring us into line with the Government promise of a 1:2 ratio for senior students.

We made the decision to put the laptops into trolleys to make it easier for as many people as possible to have access to them.

There are two trolleys with 24 laptops and one with 18. The trolleys are fitted with all the power cords needed to keep the devices charged. The trolleys are also colour coded to make differentiation and booking easier for staff.

So far they have been put to great use in Business Studies, Maths, Design and Technology and Visual Art.

As of next term, all our classrooms will have wireless access points and we will also have another 70 devices to use.

A reminder to students to try to use the same laptop all the time if possible and to save all your work on an external hard drive or memory stick.
